It was quite the thrill to watch coalition partners trying to out-do each other when it came to who could execute the most number of and longest geo-gestures be. Here's a compilation from the series of archive chapters entitled *Who Holds the Records for the Most and Longest Geo-Gestures in Fiefdom History?* that kept score.

There's been a change in the rankings for who holds the longest geo-gesture. On January 13, 2007, the last comedy sketch on 'Saturday Night Live' was observed to have a protracted Blair Maneuver that lasted 26 seconds, and thus becomes the fourth longest in history – bumping Carl Ichan from fourth to fifth:

- (i) Former President Bill Clinton – 39 seconds;
- (ii) '60 Minutes' correspondent Bob Simon – 32 seconds;
- (iii) 'Daily Show' anchor Jon Stewart – 29 seconds;
- (iv) 'Saturday Night Live' – 26 seconds;
- (v) Multi-billionaire Carl Ichan – 20 seconds.

There's been another change in the rankings for who holds the longest geo-gesture. On January 5, 2007, Donald Trump appeared on 'Letterman' and took the number one position.

His record wasn't beaten, but tied, by an Erin Maneuver executed during the opening comedy sketch for 'Saturday Night Live' on January 20, 2007.

- (i) Donald Trump – 42 seconds;
- (ii) 'Saturday Night Live' – 42 seconds;
- (iii) Former President Bill Clinton – 39 seconds;

Both first place records were shattered on January 24, 2007. During an interview hosted by CNN's Wolf Blitzer the day after the President's State of the Union Address, Vice-President Dick Cheney clearly wanted to set a new record. But more importantly, he wanted to demonstrate how critically significant the threat is held to be by Beijing's imperialistic foreign policy and the China-Canada military alliance and to signal the war

will be vigorously prosecuted until the two enemies are thoroughly defeated.

The rankings for who holds the longest geo-gesture changed again on January 28, 2007. '60 Minutes' investigative reporter Bob Simon introduced his segment on an American soldier who defected to North Korea over four decades ago and parallels were drawn between the country's dictatorial and population-oppressing regime and Canada. He executed a Blair Maneuver throughout the entire intro and in doing so bettered his earlier record. He, on behalf of '60 Minutes', now holds both the fifth and fourth record for the longest geo-gesture gesture:

- (i) Vice-President Dick Cheney – 57 seconds;
- (ii) Donald Trump – 42 seconds;
- (ii) 'Saturday Night Live – 42 seconds;
- (iii) Former President Bill Clinton – 39 seconds;

- (v) '60 Minutes' correspondent Bob Simon – 32 seconds;

One new record was set and the other rankings were amended on March 14, 2007 when U.S. Secretary of the Treasury Hank Paulson appeared on CNBC's 'Kudlow & Company'. The Secretary had just returned from another visit to China and was also reacting to the previous week's *Fiefdom* treatise evidence of a century of institutionalized racism against Canada's First Nations peoples.

In the circumstances therefore, it was understandable a member of President Bush's Cabinet would convey his, his boss', his colleagues' and coalition partners' shock, outrage and indignation that such behavior had been going on for so long and had caused so much pain, suffering, loss and death; and further that after this new evidence was documented Canada's elite behaved as if they were entitled to implement such policies.

It may not be directly relevant to geo-political dynamics, but it certainly brings an element of levity to the otherwise grueling process of diplomatic war. While there's no official competition, there seems to be a bit of one involving who gets to be the titleholder for the largest number of them in one broadcast. and longest geo-gesture.

Two days after a new record was set by U.S. Secretary of the Treasury Hank Paulson, Donald Trump shattered it during a CNN interview with Wolf Blitzer. On March 16, 2007, the multi-billionaire executed one that was incredibly long. Because of how the content of the triple-screened camera angles was edited, the beginning of the lengthy Blair Maneuver was only estimated. Give or take ten seconds, the lexiconic maneuver gesture lasted approximately two minutes.

During a thirty-seven minute Q&A at the Edward R. Murrow School of Journalism on April 10, 2007, Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice came close to trumping Donald Trump's record for the longest Blair Maneuver. This was a very unique and unprecedented occasion because beyond being attired in coalition colors, Dr. Rice never employed the diplomatic lexicon of gesturing before. This served as a huge benchmark signaling a more aggressive Cabinet in defeating authoritarianism.

The ecstatic reaction to Bob Simon's '60 Minutes' lengthy Blair Maneuver on May 6, 2007 was muted by the context in which it was delivered. The segment he was introducing was on Indonesian terrorism that's linked to the global war against al-Qaeda and thus it is inappropriate to 'jump for joy' at this latest addition to the record books.

There could be no doubt in anybody's mind on April 20, 2007 that Donald Trump wanted to set a record that would be virtually impossible to, well,...'trump'. Whether his appearance as a special co-host on 'Live with Regis & Kelly' was scheduled as a matter of course, to help promote the finale of 'The Apprentice' or as an early birthday present for the Canadian lawyer, him executing a massively long Blair Maneuver was more evidence just how much the coalition was opposed authoritarianism and will continue to apply coalition pressure in advance of purge & punish motivated military action.

'Saturday Night Live' on May 12, 2007 got into the *Fiefdom* record books again. This time the Oprah-Taylor Maneuver that got the number four position on the list of longest gesture was

repeated, *albeit* a little shorter this time; but nonetheless long enough to grab the sixth place.

The day the Prime Minister of Great Britain retired was a day that surprised the Canadian lawyer and shocked the entire fiefdom clan in Canada. There was clearly a desire on the part of the Bush administration to present evidence that there is going to be a result to the conflict with Chinada that only favors the U.S.-led coalition on July 23, 2007. That day both Secretary Paulson and Steve Forbes appeared on 'Kudlow & Company' at the same time. The latter wore Canadian prison certainty and the former clearly sought to break the record for the longest geogesture.

While the exact length of time wasn't calculated and frequently he stopped executing this record-breaking Blair Maneuver for a few seconds, it was evident he fully intended on filling the entire in-studio interview with the gesture. The time allotted for his appearance ran from about 2:10 to around 2:30 p.m. PT; and thus it is appropriate that the record be set at twenty minutes. Accounting for commercials, it is arguable the gesture lasted for fifteen minutes; or 900 seconds – almost doubling the existing record set by the multi-billionaire icon.

During the Country Music Association's Nashville music festival during the third week of July 2007, many of country music's biggest stars appeared. Reba did a duet with Kelly Clarkson, the latter of which executed a Bush Maneuver to the entire song. On July 25, 2007 the government of Prime Minister Gordon Brown wanted to let the China-Canada military alliance know exactly where it stands with respect to the threat it represents. During his statement on national security Leader of the House of Commons and Minister for Women Harriet Harman QC gestured a very protracted Execution Maneuver – one that was long enough to become the record for the longest gesture of that kind and of such duration that it made it into the fifth position.
