Here is a compilation of spring to mid-summer 2006 initiatives in this category of back-channel diplomacy:

How Many Times Did 'The West Wing' Ratify the Canadian Lawyer's US\$5 Billion Compensation?

Against the international backdrop of Operation 'Iron Fist' and Canadian diplomats in Baghdad's Green Zone being shot at by American forces to send a message to the incoming Conservative Prime Minister comes the latest episode of 'The West Wing'. Broadcast March 26, 2006 on NBC and entitled "Welcome to Wherever You Are", it became evident quickly what the Triple "E" inspired theme was. The following is a chronological transcript of scenes relevant to this subject.

- (1) In previous episodes, Whitehouse insider Toby Zeigler was fired by President Bartlet for public dissemination of national security privileged information on the existence of a secret military space shuttle. In this episode's opening scenes, Toby is faced with criminal prosecution that could bring him **five** years in federal prison.
- (2) In an opening scene, the caption reads "**Five** days Until the Election"
- (3) Senator Santo's wife and campaign team are working long hard hours during the run-up to the election; and in this scene walking on the tarmac towards the airplane; Donna remarks to the wife:

"We'll get him some sleep just as soon as we go over the **five** day schedule".
- (4) During a discussion on the plane between the Senator and his campaign staff, Josh Lyman states:

"So tomorrow Pennsylvania, Ohio, Texas; Friday Texas then California; Saturday, Sunday, Monday we hit the big **five**."

A campaign staffer then remarks:

"Big **five**; Pennsylvania, Ohio, Florida, Texas and California"

Then Senator Santos replies, asking:

"**Five** states a day?"

Then the following:

Assistant: Yes, we're going to play time zone hop-sotch; we fly with the sun.

Josh: California's screwin' up our sleep cycle.

Santos' wife: What sleep cycle?

Josh: Congressman?

Santos: **Five** days, huh? You can hang by your thumbs for **five** days."

Josh: There you have it folks; signed, sealed and delivered; the last **five** days of the Santos campaign.

- (5) The scene is located in the office of the District of Columbia's Assistant District Attorney where Toby Zeigler awaits his lawyer and to meet with the A.D.A.. To pass the time, Toby's involved in a crossword puzzle. His lawyer walks in:

Lawyer: Hello Toby. We need to prepare.

Toby: What's a **five** letter word for 'blow hard'?

- (6) The next relevant scene is in the Santos tour bus.

Santos: Election turnout [commenting on the crowd outside the campaign bus].

Assistant: Right, well we have two thousands volunteers just the major battleground states, **five** thousand in New York and an additional **five** thousand in the New York – Boston area.

[...]

Santos: Let's set a fire under the ass of every [Latino] south of Jacksonville; sure but that's a hell of an accusation for me to be throwin' out there **five** days out.

- (7) Next scene is back in the office of the A.D.A. who walks into his office:

A.D.A.: Mr. Zeigler.

Lawyer: Mr. Blake

A.D.A.: Sorry to keep you waiting. Mr. Zeigler, I invited you down here...

Toby: A **five** letter word for 'blow hard'?

Lawyer: Toby.

Toby: Just asking.

[...]

A.D.A.: You broke the law. You didn't do it alone. Tell me where you got the information and we knock [the sentence] down to a year.

Toby: With time off for good behavior. I appreciate you tryin' to keep it brief. I'll keep it brief... I'm not interested.

A.D.A.: I didn't think you'd be.

Toby: First **five** times I said "no" tip you off?

A.D.A.: They did in fact which is why I'm adding a sweetener.

Toby: What is it?

[A.D.A. slides a brief across his desk to the lawyer]

Lawyer: It's a second indictment.

Toby: For what?

A.D.A.: Obstruction of justice. Mr. Zeigler tells me where he got his information or I call the Grand Jury and have him indicted for obstruction of justice... tomorrow!

Toby: You're adding an indictment four days before a presidential election?

A.D.A.: Not only will I indict you again, I'm going to subpoena C.J. Craig, Leo McGary and President Bartlett.

Lawyer: It'll look like a cover-up; like he's covering up for someone in the Whitehouse.

A.D.A.: He hasn't given me any reason to believe he's innocent.

Toby: You're going to sabotage a national election over this?

A.D.A.: No. You are. [begins to walk out of the office] Oh, and by the way... it's "storm". **Five** letter word for "blow hard"? It's 'storm'. Pretty sure it's the word you're looking for.

- (8) Next scene back in the campaign bus; conversation between the Senator and his wife:

I'm talking about the **five** million ex-convicts who can't vote in this country.

- (9) The next relevant scene takes place at Toby's ex-wife's home. He's sitting in his car out front and calls her on his cell phone.

Toby: Can I come in?

Ex-wife: Toby... I have a lunch and two campaign events.

Toby: I could tag along; though probably not the message you want to send to your constituents, huh?

Ex-wife: Why don't you come over at **five** like we planned?

Toby: Okay.

- (10) In the last scene of the episode, the effects of sleep deprivation and hard work is wearing on Senator Santos. He walks into his private room on the campaign plane frustrated and angry. Josh follows him in:

Santos: We need to start addressing the real issues; stop wasting time on beauty pageant ephemera.

Josh: Congressman, you know as well as I do that right now what you say on [The Tonight Show with Jay] Leno and how your family looks [during this Halloween season] trick or treating are a hell of a lot more important.

Santos: Damn it, Josh. We need to focus.

Josh: We are. You like Goodwin and McNalley? Barry Hill had **five** minutes in **eight** years. You like her?

Santos: Yea, I do.

The next time the matter was high profiled demonstrated coalition partners coordinating resources to send a unified message on the matter:

How 'The Colbert Report' Tag-Teamed with 'The West Wing' to Ratify the Canadian Lawyer's US\$5 Billion Compensation?

One of the important strategies in the quiet conflict between Canadian and globally expanding authoritarianism and western democracy is to demonstrate how unified the coalition is by regularly engaging the Chinada High Command in the back-channel and demonstrating a synergy amongst partners. Such is the case most recently when 'The Colbert Report' copied an important element of NBC's 'The West Wing' to convey how united the partnership is in ratifying the Canadian lawyer's multi-billion dollar compensation.

In the 'West Wing' episode "Welcome to Wherever You Are", broadcast on April 5, 2006, producers and writers wrote a sub-plot into the script involving Toby Zeigler's problems with leaking national security information about a military space shuttle and his meetings with the Department of Justice who had indicted him not once but twice for breaking the law. In two scenes during the March 26, 2006, episode, Toby is fully engaged with a crossword puzzle and stuck on a word that has '**five**' letters. As argued in *How Many Times Did 'The West Wing' Ratify the Canadian Lawyer's US\$5 Billion Compensation?*, the number 'five', cited some twenty-three times in the episode, was a repeated ratification of the Canadian lawyer's multi-billion dollar compensation.

It came as a pleasant surprise when producers and writers of 'The Colbert Report' reproduced that same scenario in an episode broadcast later that evening. Stephen introduced the topics covered on the show and as he's closing this intro picks up a pen and folded newspaper to fill in a word, remarking:

Stephen: Let's see. **Five** letter word,... 'proven to be accurate'? H-m-m-m... got me. This is the Colbert Report.

The answer to Stephen's crossword puzzle: the Canadian lawyer's *quantum* entitlement?

Ratification was observed to continue having a high priority in the next, April 2nd, episode of 'The West Wing' as documented in the archive entry *How 'The West Wing' Again Pushed Hard and Relentlessly for Capitulation, Compensation and Change in the Last Democratic Fiefdom:*

In a later scene, the Canadian lawyer's compensation is again reinforced – three times in one instant in fact. The scene takes place in the hotel where the Santos presidential campaign team is headquartered. They are having a meeting in the hallway: Time stamp: **5:55** PM CST

And a bit later in the script:

Assistant: Something's happening [referring to election news coverage]

TV Anchor: We are just getting word now of a new development here. West Virginia is a state that democrats had hoped to carry. We are projecting though that this state and its **five** electoral votes will go to Senator Arnold Vinick. Historically, West Virginia has been as reliably democratic as possible...

The day after this 'West Wing' episode Donald Trump's hit business competition show 'The Apprentice' aired:

How Donald Trump and Mark Burnett Cleverly Ratified the US\$5 Billion Compensation Against the Last Democratic Fiefdom

On April 3, 2006 the Canadian lawyer watched intently to see if the two already staunch coalition members had woven anything into the text of the episode to add to the chorus of condemnation emanating from so many directions in the United States. He chuckled at the inventiveness of his two democracy colleagues when within seven minutes of the show's beginning, one of the contestants executed a Clooney Maneuver. The Canadian lawyer then began counting them to see how many there throughout the show; and at the end of it the tally was: **five**.

On April 9th Aaron wanted to really underscore for the edification of Canada's always watching security apparatus and human experimenters what was at the top of the coalition's agenda:

The first word in the script to the 'West Wing' episode entitled The Election: Pt. II:

"Five"

'Law & Order' kept the momentum going:

Proof NBC's 'Law & Order; Criminal Intent' Contributed to the Coalition's Coercive Diplomacy Against the Last Democratic Fiefdom

The story line of the April 16, 2006 episode was, like all of them in the Dick Wolf franchises – about a murder and it's up to the police to investigate the crime, collect the evidence and bring the malfeator(s) to justice. In this case, two 20 something women take a cab home from the bar and the driver, a serial killer, eventually confesses.

[...]

In another scene, there is an interview being conducted and in which the coalition again ratifies the Canadian lawyer's compensation – twice.

Male officer: She called you later from the hotel, is that right?

Witness: Like **five** times. They ended up at some dump, and she wanted us to come down there and get them. [...] That's right; she called **five** times.

On April 23rd – for the Canadian lawyer's birthday – Aaron scripts in what at the time were the three 'prime' lexiconic numbers as documented in archive entry *The Third Last 'West Wing' and How It Deconstructed the Last Democratic Fiefdom*. They were three - the coalition, eight - the Chinada High Command and five - *quantum* ratification.

The President Elect visits the military Situation Room for the first time to get a briefing on the status of affairs in Kazakhstan.

General: We're approaching full deployment of **80,000** ground and **30,000** support personnel taking position in the buffer zone. ... between the Russian and the Chinese forces. [...] M1A2 Abrams tanks from the First Armored Division Germany are being flown directly into Lagoos with **C5** Galaxies.

On May 15th 'The Colbert Report' continued the process of ratifying *quantum*:

How 'The Colbert Report' Linked Compensation Ratification With Chinese Malfeasance and the Tyrants of the Last Democratic Fiefdom

On Monday, May 15, 2006, Stephen *et al.* cleverly weave together coercive diplomacy and compensation ratification in the program's opening monologue. To the caption "P.S. I HATE YOU", Stephen makes the following introduction:

Tonight, the President of Iran sends George Bush a 17-page letter. If Bush sends it off to **five** other world leaders; who then send it off to **five** more world leaders, ... eventually they'll all be millionaires. [audience laughter] This is 'The Colbert Report'.

Many other coalition partners also contributed to the on-going ratification process – angered at the lack of capitulation and now convinced more than ever the Chinada threat had to be contained and neutralized:

CNBC's 'Fast Money': Dylan Ratigan Contributes to the Ratification of Compensation

CNBC has been such a long-time coalition partner and it has consistently demonstrated week after week how committed it is to both the deconstruction of Chinada and the well-being of the Canadian lawyer as he awaits emancipation and possession of his compensation. It was encouraging to again see the network's resources put to highlighting his situation.

CNBC launched a new program on Monday, September 18, 2006. It replaced Professor Kudlow's 5 o'clock p.m. EST show with a fast paced stock market analysis program featuring Dylan Ratigan. The promo for the show began a

few weeks back. The chosen format was to put Dylan behind a microphone on a fake stage in a small smoke-filled entertainment venue and have his colleagues on the show act as audience members. He's scripted to string together lines and lyrics from popular culture. His last words are:

Turn me loose. The boys are rollin' **five** times this week.
The Fast **Five** at **Five**. TV is your friend. Profit from it.

What got the Canadian lawyer's *Fiefdom* attention were several elements of this ad. The first was "turn me loose". It's a famous lyric from the Dogville-resident internationally successful rock band 'Loverboy'. As a *Fiefdom* treatise chapter explains, in the 1970s members of the predecessor band lived next door to his home in Edmonton, Alberta and he spent time socially and on the road with them for several years.

Also, Dylan is scripted to use the number 'five' **three** times – a coalition identifier.

More in the late 2006 succession of *quantum* assurances is this initiative:

Dick Wolf's 'Law & Order': Linking the Canadian Lawyer's Investment and Expenditure Priorities With the United States Military

It is universally known within the coalition how committed the Canadian lawyer has been and is to the United States military. At every opportunity going back to 2003, he's promoted its interests and he's felt empathy for soldiers' pain, injury and suffering and at times even wept when the losses were staggering. It was therefore an honor for Wolf *et al.* to link his commitment to their safety and protection in the October 27, 2006 episode.

There are many *Fiefdom* treatise chapters which reveal how dedicated and empathetic the Canadian lawyer is to the troops of the United States military; none more so than those documenting his plans to build the International E.R. Memorial Centre.

[...]

During a post-trial scene between McCoy and his boss, District Attorney Branch, a top Pentagon official – a General – is introduced requesting that a plea bargain be agreed upon.

General: [The trial's] garnered quite a bit of attention, as you can imagine. Congress is already making noise about hearings.

McCoy: What can I do for you General?

D.A.: We're being asked to plead the case Jack.

McCoy: We already went down that road. They said "no".

D.A.: Well, General Barrett's met with Whitney's attorneys and they've agreed to take **five** years.

McCoy: **Five** years?

[...]

D.A.: **Five** years is real time.

McCoy: Not for murder. Not for all the other deaths out there.

Again, Wolf *et al.* insert a coalition identifying compensation ratifier – signaling that the coalition membership is going to make sure the Canadian lawyer takes possession of his *quantum*.

The final scene is where McCoy is scripted to vent his pent-up anger at the CEO for not just the one faulty [bullet-proof] vest but what he infers from the defendant's evidence and the behavior of the company as many faulty vests.

A.D.A.: He allocates to the charges. He does **five** years.

McCoy: When did you decide that men like Garcia weren't as important as a contract or a quarterly earnings statement or your own bank account? How did you convince yourself that the blood wouldn't be on your hands Mr. Whitney?

CEO: You're wrong Mr. McCoy.

McCoy: Keep telling yourself it was for the greater good. Your conscience isn't clean. I hope **five** years is enough to make you face it.

CEO: I know what I did McCoy. I saved lives.

Throughout 2007 and 2008, compensation ratification was a regular diplomatic constituent – a lot of it being conducted through the medium of Photographic Diplomacy (see Chapter 6). An early spring 2008 initiative was documented as follows:

Ivanka Trump: Geo-Politicizing Her Interview on 'Live With Regis & Kelly' by Ratifying the Canadian Lawyer's *Quantum*

The March 4, 2008 interview of Ivanka was not just to give the goddess a chance to talk about her family, business and other initiatives. The Canadian lawyer's potential wife also wanted to use her uber-status to advance coalition interests and objectives.

Attired in Canadian punishment certainty (black dress, blond hair and red shoes) she stated boldly:

My father, I was just telling you backstage, called me around **five** minutes ago [O-S M.] and I think I perceived a hint of jealousy in his voice that I was here. You know I joke with him all the time: there's a show that should be called 'Regis, Kelly & Donald' because he loves being here so much.

When the colors green and gold entered the lexicon, they were incorporated in diplomatic activity almost daily to inundate the malfeasant with the communiqué that civil liability against them for twenty years of enslaved human experimentation and torture will be paid regardless how much they protested. A search of all *Fiefdom* treatise chapters reveals there are over 1,200 chapters in which the phrase "compensation" appears and over 1,260 chapters in which "*quantum*" appears – revealing just how much of a priority this matter has been.

There were two standout *quantum* ratifications ten days apart by the President of the United States.

US Offers \$555 Million for Palestinians

Mr. Bush said in a statement Wednesday that the \$555 billion budget bill funds the government without raising taxes and without what he called the most objectionable policy changes considered by the Congress.

He ratified damages again, choosing Canada Day, the event that is the parallel to America's 4th of July celebration, to drive home the civil liability of all malfeasant parties concerned.

President Bush: Mimics the Obama Fist Bump to Generate a Communiqué About the Close Relationship Between the Canadian Lawyer and Him to Confirm the Certainty of Prison and the Imminence of *Quantum*

President Bush and coalition partners got ingenious when planning another communiqué. This time they sought to confirm using another clever approach that imprisonment of Canada's malfeasant is an inescapable certainty and the Canadian lawyer's compensatory and punitive damages are forthcoming.

The President chose to engage in this cross-border diplomacy at the most celebratory of times – Canada Day, July 1, 2008.

The 'fist bump' first came to political prominence the evening Senator Obama won the Democratic Party's nomination – his wife choosing the gesture in front of a packed auditorium and millions of supporters to acknowledge his victory. The President reformulated that context into a potent diplomatic communiqué.



To make sure his communiqué was unambiguous, he chose a **12** year old (coalition identifier), arranged for him to be attired in prison certainty and *quantum* and followed the fist bump with a Clooney Maneuver.
